People from all religious traditions, including those who have not confessed faith in Jesus, will have a place in the "Hereafter".






Worldviews:

- The people who frequently speak into our lives;







Two worlds – Two stories:

Stories in the world of Adventism:

- A big God who loved little me,
- An affectionate family and church family who were there for me

- I was a little bit more deserving of the love of God than those outside my faith community;
- I should be cautious and skeptical about those "outsiders".
- If possible, I should avoid them and fear these imagined adversaries.

Stories in the world of Adventism:

Fear was a subtle default setting:

- Fear of believing the wrong thing;
- Fear of not praying enough, or studying the Scriptures enough
- Fear of not evangelizing my neighbors and friends enough
- Fear of not giving the tithe;
- Fear of "non-Christians"
- Fear of temples, shrines, meditation, yoga, incense sticks
- Fear of movies, dancing, tea, coffee

Life inside the Adventist bubble:

Life inside the bubbles becomes rational and normal;

"The very nature of a bubble is that there's an inside and an outside, an expanding reality-distortion field that assures people inside the bubble that they're doing things that are rational and normal.



And people outside the bubble are supposed to feel deprived, less-than, or deceived, because that's part of the fuel of life inside the bubble."



Life inside the Adventist bubble:

Those who do not share my faith (or my race or my ideology) are second-class citizens. They are the unsaved, the unbelievers, the infidel, the unredeemed; they stand outside the circle of salvation.

















School:


- Selective entry boys' school
- Founded in 1835
- Named the Royal College, Colombo with consent from Queen Victoria
- The first school to gain the prefix, "Royal", outside of the British Isles
- Enrollment in 2010: 8,600
 - One SDA



"Royal College '59 Group":

- 230 boys in one grade
- Divided into six classes
- Today 117 of us are connected online.

Religious identities and classifications are human constructs.



Religious identities are a human construct.

Religious claims are made within the framework of particular texts and myths:

- Judaism claims to be God's covenant people within the framework of its scriptures;
- Islam claims its legitimacy within the framework of its scriptures;
- Christianity claims its legitimacy within the framework of its scriptures
- Hinduism makes its claims based on the Vedas and other texts;
- Buddhism makes its claims based on the **dharma**, the teaching of the Buddha.

Religious identities are a human construct:

Religions are like languages. They seek to describe ultimate realities, but the ways they do so are almost infinitely varied. There is no universal religion, even as there is no universal language.

Identity divides:

 Religion is about identity, and identity divides.

For every "We," there is a "Them."
 The very process of creating an "Us" involves creating a "Them"





The hurdle of religion:

To see God, or good, or human dignity in those whose faith is not my faith, and whose truth is not my truth.

The hurdle of religion:

Few things have done more harm than the belief on the part of individuals and groups that he or she or they are in sole possession of the truth.

Origins of Religion:

There is no broad consensus regarding the origin of religion.

Early theorists:

- Animism
- Naturalism
- Primitive Polytheism
- Ethical Monotheism

Biblical Monotheism:

"Biblical monotheism represents the moment when mankind first lifted its sights beyond the tribe, city, and nation and thought of humanity as a whole."

"The truth at the beating heart of monotheism is that God transcends the particularities of culture and the limits of human understanding. He is my God but also the God of all mankind, even of those whose customs and way of life are unlike mine.

Classification of Religions:

There has never existed any people, anywhere, at any time, who were not in some sense spiritual or religious.



Classifications of Religions:

One purpose for religious classifications was to bring intelligibility to the vast range of knowledge about human religious experience

- Normative: "True" vs. "False"
- Geographical
- Phenomenological

The Convergence of Religions

Religions converge in at least three important ways:

- 1. Ethics
- 2. They begin with the recognition that something is wrong with the world
- 3. They recognize the human yearning to know what there is after this life

Something is wrong with humans . . .

Christianity: Sin

• Islam: Self-sufficiency (Solution: Submission)

(Solution: Salvation)

• Hinduism: Rebirth (Solution: Release)

• Buddhism: **Suffering** (Solution: the Eightfold Path)

• Judaism: Exile (Solution: Return)

• Confucianism: Chaos (Solution: Character)

• Shintoism: **Pollution** (Solution: Purification)

God is universally present:

If we hold to the biblical view that God is everywhere – universally present – should we also hold that God is present in the cultures and religions of the world?

What are the implications of such a view?

God is universally present:

Implication 1: God can be experienced in culturally conditioned images and notions in the nations of the world.

Implication 2: "The longing for justice, the quest for spirituality, the hunger for relationships, and the delight in beauty are echoes of a Voice."

--N.T. Wright, Simply Christian

The **Compassion** of Buddhism?


The **Non-violence** of Hinduism and Jainism?

The reality of Christian missions






E. Stanley Jones, Christ of the Indian Road (Abingdon Press, 1925)

- "Relationship with Jesus"



Human destiny: Limited
